

Learning about impact and influence of equity programmatic approach on organisational strategic results

Request for Proposals August 2025

The Clean Air Fund is seeking specialist expertise to lead a learning and synthesis exercise to evidence how the Clean Air Fund's focus on equity influences its ability to achieve its strategic results. The Consultant/Firm will have demonstrated experience working with INGOs, or preferably re-granters or foundations, to generate and synthesize evidence and learning to feed into concrete, robust and actionable insights for organisational strategy development, insights for Portfolio programmes and investments and for wider knowledge dissemination. Programmatic design, evaluation and learning expertise in the area of equity, social inclusion, social change/progress, policy, influencing and systems change are required.

Background to Clean Air Fund

Launched in 2019, the Clean Air Fund (CAF) is a philanthropic initiative with a mission to tackle air pollution around the world. Our aim is to help build and support a powerful global movement for clean air. We achieve this by bringing together funders, researchers, policy makers and campaigners working on a wide range of issues to find and scale solutions that will provide clean air for all. We work where the need and potential for impact are greatest: in the EU, Poland, Ghana, India, South Africa and the UK and global cities across Africa, Latin America, Asia and Europe. We also have global thematic programmes, raising air pollution up the international climate and health agendas. Our global themes span data, health, advocacy, Super-Pollutants and Private Sector Engagement. More information about the Clean Air Fund can be found on our website: www.cleanairfund.org

Background to assignment

This project is driven by CAF's strategic learning agenda, which identifies three critical open questions that must be answered to ensure CAF achieves its intended impact. This assignment helps answer one of them, specifically: **How does CAF's focus on equity influence its ability to achieve its strategic results?** For Clean Air Fund, equity in programming means working towards fairer outcomes and fairer grantmaking and project processes, in the context of our goal to reduce emissions of health-harming, climate-warming pollutants as fast as possible. This means we work on equity to support clean air for all both through what we aim to achieve through our programmes and how we work as grantmakers.

The project will concentrate on testing a critical assumption at the heart of CAF's theory of change: **That** an inclusive and equitable approach to our work will lead to better policy and better outcomes for air quality for all, more sustainable and longer-lasting change and reduced risk of political backlash.

Taking an equitable approach to clean air by engaging and prioritising populations disproportionately affected by air pollution leads to greater impact for all people. When solutions are designed to support these people and places, everyone benefits – whereas designing solutions that benefit the 'general public' without an eye towards populations disproportionately affected often leaves those most vulnerable behind.

We are dedicated to implementing equitable approaches, understanding that these efforts may require additional time and resources and could result in more gradual progress. Addressing the needs of populations disproportionately affected by air pollution involves significant stakeholder engagement and



may not always align with broader interests. Each city and country have unique equity considerations and affected populations. Therefore, achieving equitable impact will likely necessitate different strategies compared to pursuing more generalized outcomes.

In 2024–2025, CAF established equity objectives that Portfolios are integrating into their strategic goals, projects, and activities, guided by an organisational and programmatic approach that focuses on the most affected groups with specific intended outcomes and actions.

The lessons learned and recommendations formulated from this project will support CAF's portfolios in reflecting upon adaptations required in their programmatic and strategic approaches. The project will also help fulfil part of our organisational learning agenda and contribute to the development of CAF's post-2026 organisational strategy.

Project objectives and scope:

This project aims to test the critical assumption described above. It will build a deeper understanding of how focusing on populations most affected by air pollution can lead to better clean air outcomes, identify effective equity-focused tactics, explore tradeoffs in prioritising equity over speed of progress and determine how CAF's processes need to evolve to achieve its equity goals and strategic results. Given this focus, the project will explore the following specific learning questions:

1. Effectiveness:

- To what extent has prioritising populations disproportionately affected by air pollution produced measurable clean air outcomes for those groups? For wider society?
- What evidence shows that a focus on equity in programming has enhanced the impact or costeffectiveness of clean air interventions?

2. Contribution pathways:

- What equity-focused tactics have been most effective in driving progress? Where and why?
- How did these equity-focused tactics impact CAF's strategic results?
 - To what extent might the project's focus on equity be hindering overall progress, and could better outcomes have been achieved if the project had not prioritized equity?

3. Implications and trade-offs:

- What trade-offs (e.g., speed of progress vs. inclusion) does CAF face in prioritising equity?
- How can CAF best make decisions about balancing these trade-offs in future?
- What concrete lessons and recommendations arise for CAF's future strategies and processes?

Scope and limitations

This assignment is centered specifically on the Clean Air Fund's (CAF) grantmaking activities rather than its broader internal operations, such as governance structures or partnership frameworks. The scope will

focus on projects that meet specific criteria related to their maturity—for example, completed projects or those that have been active for at least one year—to ensure sufficient information for analysis.

Additionally, the study will acknowledge key limitations, particularly the fact that many projects may not have systematically tracked equity-related objectives or indicators to date. As a result, this will be a retrospective assessment, and we anticipate some gaps in available data, which will need to be clearly communicated as part of the findings.

Workstreams and outputs:

1) Desk Review

Conduct a desk review of past and existing equity project documents, equity specific outcomes and assess equity within CAFs current grantmaking processes, to identify lessons and recommendations. This workstream will identify potential case studies (stories of impact) to explore under workstream two (below).

2) Literature review

Conduct a literature review will encompass the wider evidence landscape related to the role of equity in promoting policy progress and organisational outcomes to identify effective and proven strategies, as well as unsuccessful strategies, and knowledge gaps which need to be addressed. The review will draw on evidence from the air quality, health and climate sectors where available, as well as any wider relevant fields.

Outputs:

- A succinct action-focused review, summarising lessons and recommendations regarding how a focus on equity enables or hinders progress towards clean air goals, as relevant for the work of the Clean Air Fund.
- A long list of potential case studies.

3) Generating Case Studies and learning synthesis report

Using evidence from a selection of past and current projects, develop at least three case studies showcasing how equitable work has helped to further or hindered intended results. These case studies will highlight best practices, successes, and areas for improvement and recommendations and opportunities for CAF and be suitable for sharing with the wider sector.

Please note that the final criteria for case study selection will be confirmed during the inception phase; however, the following guiding considerations are anticipated:

- **Geographic diversity:** Ensuring representation from portfolios implemented in both the Global North and Global South to capture a wide range of contextual factors.
- **Thematic diversity:** Including projects that span different focus areas within portfolios to reflect the breadth of our work.
- **Variation in outcomes:** Selecting projects that demonstrate a mix of results, from highly successful initiatives to those that faced notable challenges, to provide balanced learning.
 - Equity-focussed projects which hindered the achievement of CAF's objectives (1) and had limited impact (2): at least one of the case studies shall focus on examining cases



where a focus on equity may have hindered progress/achievement of organisational objectives or produced limited impact. Such case studies can provide critical insights into what approaches or strategies may be less effective, thereby guiding future decision-making on what to avoid and what to strengthen. Applying these considerations will enable the study to generate rich, nuanced insights that are comprehensive and relevant across diverse contexts, themes, and phases of project implementation.

• **Project maturity and transformative changes:** Incorporating projects at different stages of their lifecycle, such as recently completed initiatives and those with longer implementation histories provided that project implementation resulted in significant transformative changes.

Outputs:

- At least three in depth, learning focussed case studies, exploring the additive or subtractive role(s) which a focus on equity has had on progress towards CAFs goals.
- A succinct, action focussed learning report, to synthesise the results from the desk and literature reviews and case studies to document insights and recommendations for CAF.

4) Creating a blog about CAF's organisational and programmatic approaches to equity

Collate results and lessons in an externally facing blog which promotes CAF's approach to equity within the climate change and air quality sectors. This will also include similarities and differences across thematic and geographic portfolios.

Outputs:

- A blog showcasing and promoting CAF's organisational and programmatic approach to equity, suitable for external publication.
- Final **learning workshop / sense-making session** with CAF staff whose projects were sampled to stress-test findings and co-prioritise the recommendations.
- Final internal PPTX presentation summarising the purpose, scope, approach, limitations, findings and recommendations of the assignment. Recommendations must be practical, prioritised, and feasible for integration into CAF's next strategic plan and portfolio management processes including project implementation.

Methodological approach

The selected consultant or team will be expected to apply a qualitative approach to data collection and analysis, incorporating both primary and secondary sources, to build a comprehensive and credible evidence base to underpin the literature review, case studies and learning report.

Secondary Data Collection: The review will begin with a structured analysis of existing documentation, including Clean Air Fund's internal evidence and wider relevant literature on the additive or subtractive roles(s) of equity programming from the air quality and climate sectors. Analysis of secondary data will inform the learning synthesis report. The process will generate a long list of potential Clean Air Fund projects upon which to base primary data collection and case studies. The primary data review will be used to triangulate evidence and findings from secondary data and inform the synthesised learning report and blog.

A sampling framework will be developed in collaboration with the Clean Air Fund to guide the selection of the case studies. This will be based on clear, pre-agreed criteria to ensure a diverse and relevant set of



projects are included. Key considerations in relation to selection criteria are in relation to geographic and thematic diversity, outcomes achieved, project maturity and transformative changes as stated earlier.

<u>Primary Data Collection</u>: Based on the agreed focus for the case studies and any areas where further investigation is valuable for the learning report, the consultancy team will conduct <u>online semi-structured in-depth interviews</u> with portfolio focal points who led or supported the implementation of these projects. These interviews will be essential to capturing additional insights, clarifying project outcomes, and supplementing gaps in the documented evidence. <u>At least one interview or focus group discussion per case study with representatives of our grantees is expected to inform the development of the case <u>studies</u>. Additional inputs from grantees beyond those projects featured in the case studies can be considered where it will add value to the lessons identified in the learning report. <u>Where appropriate</u>, <u>ethical and feasible</u>, the consultant should include community perspectives, particularly from groups <u>disproportionately affected</u>, to triangulate findings from portfolio team and grantee perspectives.</u>

We are open to consider different options dependent on the specific expertise of the consultancy team. We expect consultants to follow the principles of the <u>Equitable Evaluation Framework</u>.

Workstream 1: Literature Review of past and existing equity project documents to capture lessons learned and identify potential case studies (stories of impact).

Outputs:

- o Short desk and literature review report
- Skeleton of learning report
- Longlist of potential case studies (at least 15)
- Skeleton of **blog** promoting CAF's organisational and programmatic approach to equity.

Workstream 2: In-depth interviews with portfolios and grantees and potentially directly affected communities to supplement evidence gathered in the desk and literature reviews.

Outputs:

- o Internal **presentation** of findings
- Draft learning report
- Draft potential case studies (at least 2-3)
- Draft blog (Word)
- o **Note** on application of equity principles during the project (Word)⁸

Governance

The project is managed by the MEL team at the Clean Air Fund supported by Equity specialists and advising organisations from the Climate Change Network.

Primary audience and users: CAFs Senior Leadership Team, Portfolio teams within CAF.

³ The project is aiming to align with the principles of equitable evaluation. Proposal format and requirements

The successful consultancy company or team will have a demonstrated track record of delivering similar activities for global organizations. Research, evaluations, programmatic design, equity and inclusion, writing and communications skills are needed to successfully deliver this assignment.

Applicants should provide:

- A proposal for executing this assignment. This would include your approach, an expanded set of proposed activities, deliverables, methods and associated deadlines to meet the project objectives.
- A budget with activity and cost breakdown, including estimated days and day rates. The proposal and budget will not exceed five pages, with CVs of the proposed team members included as Annexes.
- A short and succinct overview of similar assignments you may have conducted for other organisations.

We are interested in proposals which emphasise co-design with CAF staff as part of the inception phase and throughout to refine questions, the approach, develop outputs and identify priority gaps.

Submissions may be shared with partner stakeholders such as the CAF Monitoring, Evaluation, and Learning Advisory Group.
